

Methodological Competency

We are continuing to briefly explore each of the 12 Characteristics of the 4C Quality Faculty model. Last issue, we looked at Competency in Technology. This issue, we will conclude the Competency dimension with a quick review of Methodology. This characteristic deals with the wider array of theories, models, and practices related to teaching and learning. Methodology primarily deals with connecting the right methods of instruction to the context, content, and types of learners. A Quality Faculty understands there



are a variety of ways of learning and are skilled at understanding the student as learner, identifying which ways of learning best fit the situation or subject, and connecting students to the learning process. In short, this characteristic emphasizes learning and what the faculty member can do to facilitate it happening. Read more here...

We have all had the experience of having students sitting in our classes, looking directly at us, and knowing, just knowing, that they are not paying the least bit of attention to what we are talking about or what the topic of the day is. In fact, if we don't see this in our classes (and I believe we



all do...it's just that some of us don't wish to admit it), all an instructor has to do is review assignments, quizzes, or exams to find evidence that students don't understand key concepts that were highlighted as "really important" or "critical" to understanding the material. There is a healthy amount of research on attention in the cognitive psychology literature. Topics include focused attention, divided attention, executive control of attention, attention span, etc. All of the topics are directly relevant to the undergraduate student. How do we help our students develop the skills necessary to focus their attention on our classes? Read more here...

Promoting Academic Integrity: Are We Doing Enough?

Cheating continues to be a pervasive problem in college courses. Institutions have policies designed to prevent it and faculty employ a range of strategies that aim to catch those who do. And still the problem persists. A study at a university



in Australia, where it is the students' responsibility to read and follow the academic integrity policy, found that only 50% of the students said they read the policy. Nonetheless, 80% rated their understanding of plagiarism 7 or above on an 11-point scale. However, when asked to identify a set of behaviors associated with academic dishonesty, their answers indicated confusion and misunderstanding of cheating, plagiarism, and other forms of collusion that occur in courses and on campus. Could it be that in our efforts to prevent cheating we have failed to also promote academic integrity? Read more here...
